HSE News

And here are the latest statistics from the UK HSE. They are a sober reminder as to why organisations like GOSHA are needed to supplement the work of laws, regulations, ACoPs and the HSE plus health & safety consultants and trainers.

UK annual statistics for 2023 to 2024 released in Great Britain. The <u>annual work-related health and safety figures for 2023 to 2024</u> include:

- **1.7 million** working people suffering from a work-related illness, of which:
 - o 776,000 workers are suffering work-related stress, depression or anxiety
 - o **543,000** workers are suffering from a work-related musculoskeletal disorder
- 138 workers killed in work-related accidents
- 33.7 million working days lost due to work-related illness and workplace injury
- **£21.6 billion** estimated cost of injuries and ill health from current working conditions (2022 to 2023)
